**General Rules for the Produce Section:**

**Exhibitors must be members of the Pontiac Agricultural Society. Entries must be brought to the Exhibit Hall to be placed for exhibiting on Wednesday, September 2, 2026 between 6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. No late entries please. Judging to commence Thursday, September 3, 2026 at 9:00 a.m., only committee members can be present during judging.**

**Entries must be picked up on Monday, September 7, 2026 between **\*\*NEW TIME 4:00 and 5:00 p.m. \*\*** Entries cannot be removed before this time. If entries are removed before the designated time no prize money can be awarded.**

**- One entry only per person per class is permitted. Entries must be grown by the exhibitor**

**- Entries must be accompanied by entry form, membership number and tags. If required, entries should be placed on a clean and solid heavy disposable plate, basket, or another suitable container. Please do not use any container of value. Securely attach the tag with string or rubber bands (not taped) to the exhibit.**

**- When asked for more than one specimen, exhibits should be of uniform size and shape.**

**- All entries should name the variety, if possible, do so on the back of the Exhibitor tag.**

**- All vegetables and root crops should be lightly cleaned with a brush but not washed. Their freshness will last longer.**

**- Only one entry per exhibitor to a class, except in "any other" (A.O.V.) class, where any number of entries may be shown provided the exhibits are of different varieties and no class is listed in the schedule for the entry. No sub-divisions are permitted for any class, regardless of the number of entries.**

**- Pontiac Agricultural Society, its Directors, Committee, and Employees will take all reasonable precautions to ensure safety of the exhibits, but they cannot be responsible for any lost, stolen or damaged articles, however caused.**

**- The Pontiac Agricultural Society is not responsible for articles left in the Exhibit Hall after 5:00 pm on Monday, September 7, 2026.**

Exhibitors must be members of the Society. Only one entry per exhibitor/farm entity per class is permitted. **Entries MUST be shown in clear plastic bags.** Entries must have exact quantities and must be grown by the exhibitor not more than 1 year prior to the Fair. **All varieties must be named.**

**One exhibit per farm.** A minimum of 5 acres in the specified variety is required. All hay must be 2026 crop. Hay and straw entries will consist of a 10 cm. (4") flake, machine baled and undisturbed. One half of the flake will be used for judging. The balance will be placed in a plastic bag for exhibit.
